## R E S O L U T I O N.

*Cuttack, the 6th August 1936.*

READ—

Letter no. F. 1-6 (a) /36-C.A.R., dated the 30th April 1936, from the Government of India, Department of Education, Health and Lands.

THE Government of India in forwarding copies of certain resolutions passed by the Central Advisory Board of Education, on the question of the necessity for a radical readjustment of the present system of education in schools so as to enable them at the completion of appropriate stages to be diverted to occupations or to separate vocational institutions, have commended them to the early and sympathetic attention of local Governments, and have promised to render assistance by providing at their cost expert aid for the planning of vocational training. The Government of Orissa have decided to take advantage of this offer of assistance and also to appoint a small committee of officials and non-officials to advise them regarding the question of general educational reconstruction and to suggest points on which the advice of the experts should be sought.

The Committee will consist of the following members:—

- (1) The Director of Public Instruction, Orissa, *Chairman*.
- (2) The Inspectress of Schools, Orissa.
- (3) The Divisional Inspector of Schools, North Orissa, *Secretary*.
- (4) The District Educational Officer, Ganjam.
- (5) Raja Babadur Sri Ram Chandra Mardaraj Deo of Khalikota.
- (6) Tikayat Sailendra Narayan Bhanj Deo of Kanika.
- (7) Professor P. K. Parija, Offg. Principal, Ravenshaw College, Cuttack.
- (8) Sriman M. G. Patnaik Mahasayo.
- (9) Babu Godavaris Misra.
- (10) Rai Sahib Blikari Charan Patnaik.

The terms of reference of the Committee will be—

- (1) To consider the scheme of reorganisation of education outlined in the resolutions of the Central Advisory Board, forwarded with Government of India letter no. F-1-6 (a)/36, the various expressions of local opinion that have been collected and to advise on the general lines of the reply to be submitted by the Government of Orissa especially on the following points:—
  - (a) whether the scheme of reorganisation should extend to the elementary stage and whether the limits of this stage, viz., 5 *plus* to 11 *plus* suggested by the Director of Public Instruction are suitable;
  - (b) whether the limits of the succeeding stage, viz., 4 years (11 *plus* to 15 *plus*) and its new name, viz., lower secondary are suitable;

- (c) whether at this lower secondary stage any attempt should be made to introduce vocational training in non-rural schools and if so what forms of vocational training;
- (d) if vocational training is introduced into non-rural lower secondary schools to what extent the general education given in them should be adjusted to the requirements of the succeeding high school stage;
- (e) how the attuning of rural lower secondary schools to village needs can best be secured;
- (f) what should be the duration of the high school stage and whether that stage should cover any part of the course at present covered by the Intermediate University Course; and
- (g) what kind of higher technical course parallel with the new high school course could find a useful place in the educational equipment of Orissa.
- (2) To consider what steps are necessary to provide the institutions and the trained teachers required for carrying out the proposals made by the Committee.
- (3) To advise on schemes designed for making an early start on the provision of these institutions and training arrangements.
- (4) To suggest the points on which the advice of experts offered by the Government of India should be sought both (i) in the matter of adapting the existing educational framework to the needs arising from the adoption of the suggested scheme of reorganisation, and (ii) in the matter of planning the various vocational training suggested.

The non-official members are authorised under rule 246 (a) of the Bihar and Orissa Service Code to draw travelling allowance at first class rates and those who are members of the Orissa Advisory Committee will get Rs. 10 a day as halting allowance. The Director of Public Instruction, Orissa, is authorised to countersign the travelling allowance bills of the non-official members.

ORDER.—Ordered that the resolution be published in the *Orissa Gazette* and that copies be forwarded to all members of the Committee, the Revenue Commissioner (Director of Industries and Director of Agriculture) Orissa, the Director of Public Instruction, Orissa, and the Finance Department of Government.

Udayagiri taluk; gingelly, and sugarcane in Ghumsur taluk; sugarcane, gingelly, elephantyam and <i>ragi</i> in Aska taluk; gingelly, groundnut <i>ragi</i> and sugarcane in Chatrapur taluk, paddy and <i>ragi</i> in Kudala taluk; gingelly, <i>sua</i> and redgram in Surada taluk;—extents appreciable—condition fair. Fodder available. Cattle disease—Rinderpest in Malkanagiri taluk. Stock of food grains sufficient. Prospects normal. Jeypore exporting rice. Common rice selling at 13 seers a rupee at Jeypore and 10 seers at Gunupur and Parlakimedi taluks.

GENERAL SUMMARY.—During the week under report rain fell in all the districts of the province. The fall was heavy in parts of Ganjam district and light to moderate elsewhere. Transplantation of paddy is going on. *Beali* paddy and *mandua* are in ears in Cuttack and Puri districts. *Ragi* is being harvested in Ganjam districts. Condition of the Jute crop is reported to be healthy and fair in Cuttack and Balasore districts. Sugarcane is not thriving in the Balasore district owing to excessive rain. Supply of fodder and water is reported to be sufficient. The average price of local common rice at headquarters markets is 12.94 seers a rupee. Cattle disease is reported from parts of Cuttack, Balasore, Sambalpur, Puri and Koraput districts.
