RESOLUTION.

Government of Madras Order no. 314-Law and Public Health, dated the 17th February 1936. Government of Madras Order no. 1767-Law (Education), dated the 24th August

Government of Madras Order no. 1486-Law (Education), dated the 18th August

In their order no. 24-Law (Education), dated the 5th January 1923, the Government of Madras constituted for every district a District Secondary Education Board which exercised in respect of secondary education the functions of co-ordination and advice which are exercised in a greater or less decree over collegiate education by the University and over elementary education by the District Educational Councils. The Boards were last reconstituted in Matras Government Order no. 223-Law (Education), dated the 4th February 1928, and the number of members for the District Secondary Education Board for Ganjam was then fixed at 9 viz. 6 elected and 3 nominated. This number was raised to 10 in Madris Government Order no. 314-Education and Public Health, dated the 7th February 1936, in order to provide for the representation of each of the district boards of Ganjam and Chicacole after bifurcation.

2. On the constitution of Orissa as a separate Province with effect from the 1st April 1936, the district of Ganjam comprises only a part of the old district of Ganjam. The portion of the old Parkkimedi Taluk remaining in the Orissa Province is included in the new distrct of Koraput, while South Ganjam including Chicacole town now forms a part of the Vizagapatam district of the Madras Presidency. The area formerly served by the Ganjam District Secondary Education Board has thus been distributed over three different districts. Government are pleased to dissolve the old Board and constitute a fresh District Secondary Education Board for Ganjam district and the plains portion of the Parlacimedi Taluk in the Koraput district. The Board will elect its own President from among its members. The District Education Officer, Ganjam, will be the Secretary to and Convener of the Board.

- 3. The Board will continue to be Advisory, its advice being sought on the following matter:—
 - (i) expansion and development of secondary education for boys and girls and the opening of new secondary schools,
 - (ii) the security of tenure of teachers,
 - (iii) provident funds,
 - (iv) the financing of aided schools,
 - (v) the provision of hostels,
 - (vi) the courses of study in secondary schools and the adoption of vernaculars as the media of instruction and examination,
 - (vii) vocational education,
 - (viii) the co-operative movement in schools,
 - (ix) the development of the Boy Scout and Girl Guide Movements,
 - (x) Moral instruction and discipline in schools,
 - (xi) medical inspection,
 - (xii) refresher courses,
 - (xiii) physical education and the provisions of playgrounds.

In regard to matters connected with the Boy Scout and the Girl Guide Movements, the Board will act in conjunction with District Scout Councils.

- 4. The Board is authorised to invite persons specially qualified to give advice by reason of their experience or interest in educational problems, to take part in meetings whenever the question at issue calls for such action. The Board is advised to appoint a sub-committee for women's education.
- 5. Elections should be conducted in accordance with the rules prescribed in Government of Madras order no. 1767-Law (Education), dated the 24th August 1928, and no. 1486-Law (Education), dated the 18th August 1933.
- 6. The Director of Public Instruction, Orissa, is requested to submit to Government in due course, in consultation with the Collectors of Ganjam and Koraput, his recommendations for filling up the seats reserved for nomination on the Board.

Ordered that the resolution be published in the Orissa Gazette and that copies be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction, Orissa, the Collectors of Ganjam and Koraput, the District Educational Officer, Ganjam, President of the District Secondary Education Board, Ganjam, the President of the Ganjam district board, the chairmen of the Municipal Councils of Berhampur and Parlakimedi.
