RESOLUTION.

The 6th May 1936.

READ—

- (1) Resolution no. 1779-D., dated the 16th October 1931 recorded by the Government of Bihar and Orissa.
- (2) Letter no. 56-Ind., dated the 22nd April 1936 from the Revenue Commissioner, Orissa.

IN the resolution recorded by the Government of Bihar and Orissa in the Ministry of Education on the 16th October 1931 the Commissioner of the Orissa Division was appointed to be the *ex-officio* President of the Managing Committee of the Orissa School of Engineering at Cuttack. But on account of the constitution of Orissa into a separate province from the 1st April 1936 the designation of the Divisional Commissioner has been changed. The Government of Orissa are therefore pleased to appoint the Revenue Commissioner, Orissa, to be the *ex-officio* President of the Managing Committee of the Orissa School of Engineering at Cuttack.

ORDER.—Ordered that the resolution be published in the *Orissa Gazette* and that a copy be forwarded to the Revenue Commissioner, Orissa and to all members of the managing committee.

6	KORAPUT	0.59	Rainfall at Nowrangpur 2.50 and at Rayaghada 0.53 inch. Weather thundering. First ploughing in Nowrangpur and Malkanagiri taluks. Sugarcane not thriving in Parlakimedi taluk and thriving in Nawrangpur taluk. Water scarcity in parts of Malkanagiri, Parlakimedi taluks. Fodder insufficient in parts of Malkanagiri and Bissemcutak taluks. Cattle-disease in Nawrangpur taluk. Public health, wages and prospects normal. Labour available. Cholera in Parlakimedi taluk subsided. Stock of food-grains sufficient. Common rice selling at 14 seers a rupee at Jeyapur, 12½ seers at Gunupur and at 10 seers at Parlakimedi.

GENERAL SUMMARY :—During the week under report light to moderate rain fell in all the districts of the province. Threshing of winter rice is still in progress in Puri. Harvesting of *dalua* paddy continues in Puri. Sugarcane is thriving except in Parlakimedi taluk of Koraput. *Mandua*, *china*, *mung* and *til* are being harvested. Ploughing and manuring of paddy fields continue. The average price of local common rice at the headquarters markets was 15.45 seers a rupee. Supply of fodder and water is reported to be sufficient except in parts of Koraput. Cattle-disease is reported from two districts.
