## INDIAN POLICE MEDAL.

(l'olice).

No. F-114/25/36-Police.—His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General of India has been pleased to confer the Indian Police Medal on the following officers:—

Statement of services for which the decoration has been conferred.

#### Orissa

101. Satish Chandra Chatterji, Deputy Superintendent of Police.

Babu Satish Chandra Chatterji was appointed a Sub-Inspector of Police early in 1906, promoted to the rank of Inspector in 1920 and confirmed as Deputy Superintendent in 1934. In the last 30 years of his service he has never received any censure or adverse comment; but has been given 4 cash rewards and several good service marks and com-The annual remarks written by mendations. Superintendents of Police under whom he has served have been consistently satisfactory and relate not only to work done in districts also in the Criminal Investigation Department and in the Constables' Training School. He has the reputation of being an industrious and intelligent worker and is the type of steady and reliable officer which forms the backbone of any Police Force and sets a good example to the younger men.

102. Nippani Jagannadha Rao, Officiating Inspector of Police.

In his whole service Babu Nippani Jagannadha Rao has shown great devotion to duty and much zeal. He worked in the capacity of an Intelligence Officer during Alluri Sri Rama Razu's Fituri (Rebellion) of 1922-24. In 1924 he was placed on special duty in Rajahmundry town in connection with an outbreak of crime and he was responsible for the detection of a series of burglaries. For this good work he was awarded Rs. 50 by the Inspector-General of Police, Madras.

In 1925 he was again placed on secret special duty in connection with the alleged murder of a British Military Officer at Rajahmundry. His investigation was made as far afield as Poona, Belgaum, the Kolar Gold Fields and places in the Madras Presidency.

In 1926 at his own request he was trained in prosecution work and until 1929 he was Prosecuting Sub-Inspector, Rajahmundry.

He did excellent work in the 1930-31 Civil Disobedience Movement in East Godavari district. He was selected for training in the C. I. D., Madras, and on his return he introduced the District Intelligence Bureau in addition to being employed on special duty when the occasion arose.

He was also on special duty in East Godavari district when the Civil Disobedience Movement was revived in 1931-32 and again in the Cocanada Conspiracy Case—a conspiracy to assassinate the Deputy Superintendent of Police, Cocanada, and other officers.

Name of officer and rank.

Statement of services for which the decoration has been conferred.

He was on special duty for 4 months and his investigation extended throughout the Madras Presidency and Pondicherry. He also gathered evidence which was used in the Madras Conspiracy Case. During the trial of the Cocanada Conspiracy Case he was selected to assist the specially appointed Public Prosecutor.

In 1934 he was responsible for the detection of an important inter-district counterfeit coining case and was on duty with the Public Prosecutor before the High Court, Madras.

During the past 18 months as in-charge of the circle he has worked with great zeal and has done much to improve police work in Koraput and Jeypore Circles.

His character and conduct are exemplary and wherever he has been he has earned the respect of the public.

During his 23 years' service he has earned 16 good service entries and 10 cash rewards.

Sk. Abdul Rahim entered the Police force as a constable in the year 1909 and was promoted to the rank of Havildar in 1929. During his 27 years of service, he carned 53 rewards, 2 good service marks and 10 commendations. He has an excellent record all through, during which, he always won the appreciation of his superiors by his smart captures of burglars, thieves and absconders. He did excellent work during the last Civil Disobedience Movement.

104. Brindaban Chandra Konungo, Prosecuting Babu Brindaban Chandra Kanungo joined the Police as a Sub-Inspector in 1907. As

the Police as a Sub-Inspector in 1907. As Sub-Inspector of Police, he was a successful investigating officer with plenty of detective ability. By devotion to duty, he won the appreciation of his superiors and was promoted to the rank of Inspector in the year 1925. He has a remarkably blameless record extending over a period of 29 years of service, entirely without punishment, either major or minor, whereas 39 rewards, 22 good service marks and 48 commendations were earned. He was mentioned for several successive years in the Annual Administration Reports. As Prosecuting Inspector he is a good disciplinarian and his legal acumen has made him popular with both Bench and Bar. keenness and energy, during the last Civil Disobedience Movement, socured for him a Sanad from His Excellency the Governor of Bihar and Orissa.
