GOVERNMENT OF ORISSA.

APPOINTMENT DEPARTMENT.

R E S O L U T I O N .

Cuttack, the 21st January 1937.

The question of the cadre strength of the Orissa Civil Service (Executive Branch) and the Subordinate Civil Service has been under the consideration of Government for some time. The detailed examination of the cadres has not yet been completed; but it is expected that the strength of the cadre for the Subordinate Civil Service will be approximately 70 and that of the Provincial Civil Service will be approximately 40. His Excellency the Governor has decided that all vacancies arising from time to time in the Provincial Service shall ordinarily be filled by promotion. The Subordinate Civil Service shall be filled by direct appointment or by promotion or by transfer of officers already in Government service.

2. The number of appointments to be made to the Subordinate Civil Service during the current year has to be fixed. Upon a consideration of the number of vacancies that are likely to occur within the next 2 or 3 years in both the Services and other factors affecting recruitment, and in order to have a sufficient number of officers trained in good time to replace those who will be reverting to Madras, His Excellency the Governor has decided that 15 appointments should be made to the Orissa Subordinate Service this year, and that not less than one-third and not more than two-thirds of these shall be direct recruits.

3. The direct appointments to the Subordinate Service will be made in accordance with the rules appended to this resolution. Applications will be received by District Officers up till 17th February 1937. Candidates will be interviewed by a Selection Board at Cuttack whose constitution will be announced later.

4. A selection of candidates for inclusion in the waiting list of the upper division of the Secretariat will also be made from among the candidates, by the Selection Board. Candidates should therefore state in their application whether they are prepared in the event of not obtaining a post in the Subordinate Civil Service to accept a post in the upper division of the Secretariat if offered to them.

5. Candidates finally selected for appointment to the Orissa Subordinate Civil Service or the upper division of the Secretariat will be called upon to satisfy a Medical Board as to their fitness for appointment to Government service.

6. The scale of pay for the Subordinate Service has not yet been finally settled but will be approximately Rs. 100 and Rs. 125 on probation, and Rs. 140—300 on confirmation.

Rules for admission to the Orissa Subordinate Civil Service (Direct appointments).

1. Except under the special orders of Government, no candidate is eligible for appointment unless he is an Oriya or is domiciled in the Province of Orissa. Those who are not Oriyas but claim to be eligible by domicile in Orissa, must produce a domicile certificate signed by the District Officer.

2. A candidate for appointment on this occasion must—

(a) be under 27 years and over 20 years of age on the 1st day of January 1937;

(b) be of good character; and

(c) be of sound health, good physique and active habits and free from organic defects or bodily infirmity; and

(d) hold a degree of a University recognised by Government, or have passed the Diploma Examination in the first or second division from the Aitchison College, Lahore, the Mayo College, Ajmere, the Daly College, Indore, the Raj-Rumar College, Rajkot, or the Raj Kumar College, Raipur, or have passed the Cambridge School Certificate examination, or possess other educational qualifications which the Governor in Council may decide to be equivalent to those prescribed above.

3. (a) Every candidate shall submit his application in his own handwriting with one duplicate copy in the form annexed to these rules to the Collector of his home district so as to reach the latter not later than 17th February 1937.

(b) Together with his form of application, every candidate must submit—

(i) evidence that he has obtained the degree referred to in rule 2(d) above,

(ii) a certificate of character and conduct from the Principal of the institution at which he last studied for not less than one year, or from some responsible officer of Government,

(iii) a certificate of health and fitness from a Civil Surgeon,

(iv) evidence of age,

(v) a certificate of domicile granted by the District Officer of the district in which he claims domicile if such certificate is required,

(vi) a true copy of all documents other than the medical certificate submitted in original.

4. Upon receipt of the applications from candidates, District Officers are required to forward the applications direct to the Chief Secretary to Government after completing the endorsements in Part II of the Application Form not later than 27th February 1937.

5. Selected candidates will be interviewed by a Selection Board on dates to be fixed, and the Board shall nominate and arrange in order of preference such number of candidates as may be fixed by the Governor.

6. (a) The final selection of candidates shall be made by the Governor from amongst those who have been nominated by the Selection Board.

(b) Every candidate so selected shall be examined by a Medical Board. If a candidate fails to obtain a medical certificate of fitness from that Board he will not be appointed to the service.

7. Every candidate will be appointed on probation in the first instance, and will not be eligible for confirmation until he has completed two years' service, and passed all the tests and produced all the certificates that may be prescribed, and is considered by the local Government fit for confirmation as a Sub-Deputy Collector.

8. Any attempt on the part of a candidate to enlist support for his application will disqualify him for appointment.

7. At what institutions have you been educated during the last four years and what academic distinction have you obtained? Did you take part in school or college games and societies?

8. Have you ever held any temporary employment under Government? If so, state the nature of this employment and the length of time you held it.

9. Are any members of your family in Government service? If so, state their names and the appointment held by each.

PART II—(to be filled in by the District Officer who will forward the application and the necessary certificates to the Chief Secretary to the Government of Orissa, Cuttack, not later than the date prescribed.)

Answer.

1. Is the candidate or any member of his family personally known to you? If so, do you consider that he is likely to make a good officer in the Subordinate Civil Service?

2. Do you recommend that he should be interviewed by the Selection Board?

3. Do you consider that he is by his social position qualified to hold an appointment in the Orissa Subordinate Civil Service?

4. Have any member of his family rendered such service to Government as would entitle his case to special consideration? If so, the nature of these services should be indicated.

GENERAL SUMMARY.—During the week under report there was no rain in the Province. The harvesting and the threshing of *saradh* paddy are in progress. Transplantation of *dalua* paddy is going on in the Cuttack district and it is thriving in the Puri district. Planting of sugarcane continues in the Cuttack district and its harvesting and pressing are going on. Mustard and castor are in flowers and pods. Transplantation of tobacco is going on in the Cuttack district and its harvesting continues in the Koraput district. The harvesting of redgram, *til*, mustard, turmeric and *gingelly* continues in the Ganjam district. Wheat, *mung* and linseed are thriving. Supply of fodder and water is reported to be sufficient. The average price of local common rice is 19.14 seers a rupee against 18.86 seers for the preceding week in North Orissa and 13.71 seers against 14.33 seers in South Orissa. The figures for North and South Orissa for the corresponding period of last year are 15.63 and 12.08 seers a rupee respectively. Cattle disease is reported from parts of the Puri district.
