It is hereby notified for the information of intending candidates for teacher's training, managers of schools and inspecting officers of Ganjam and Koraput districts that candidates for elementary grade will be admitted in July 1944 into the Government Training School, Berhampur, Russelkonda and Gunupur and in April 1944 into the Government Training School at Tikkaballi.

(2) Candidates who have passed the III form or VIII standard (marked fair) examination are eligible for admission. Preference will be given to those candidates whose educational qualifications are above the minimum fixed.

(3) The inspecting officers are requested to forward lists for admission of candidates into the Government Training School at Berhampur, Russelkonda and Gunupur with their recommendations so as to reach this office on or before 20th May 1944 and those for the Government Training School at Tikkaballi on or before 1st March 1944. The intending candidates should forward their applications in the prescribed form to the inspecting officers through their managers of schools 10 days before the date fixed above for submission of lists to this office. Original general educational certificates should not be enclosed to the applications.

(4) A preliminary selection of candidates for admission into the elementary grade will be made in this office and the selected candidates will be required to sit for an entrance test examination to be held at centres and on the dates to be fixed by this office. Final selection of candidates for admission will be made on the result of the examination. The text examination will include intelligence tests and questions on general knowledge. The candidates will sit at the test examination at their own cost and will have to pay a small fee to cover expenses on the printing of question papers.

**THE ELLIOT PRIZE FOR SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH
FOR 1944—48**

In accordance with the Government of Bengal, General Department, revised notification No. 112-T. Edn., dated the 5th May 1917, published in Part I, page 667 of the *Calcutta Gazette*, 1917, the Elliot Prize for Scientific Research for 1944 will be awarded to the author of the best original essays giving the results of original research or investigation made by the candidate in Mathematics and published during the years 1940—43 inclusive.

In accordance with the notification cited above, the Elliot Prize for Scientific Research for 1945 will be awarded to the author of the best original essays giving the results of original research or investigation made by the candidate in Chemistry and published during the years 1941—44 inclusive.

Any native of Bengal, Bihar or Orissa, or any Anglo-Indian or domiciled European, residing in Bengal, Bihar or Orissa, may compete for the prize.

The essays of competitors must be sent in so as to reach the President of the Royal Asiatic Society of Bengal, c/o the General Secretary, 1, Park Street, Calcutta, by the end of June of this year. Author's reports must be submitted and not manuscripts. The prize will be awarded to the best competitor and be conferred publicly at the Annual General Meeting of the Royal Asiatic Society of Bengal in February 1945.

Preference will be given to researches leading to discoveries likely to develop the industrial resources of Bengal, Bihar or Orissa.

The value of the prize will not be less than Rs. 210. In the event of no essay being deemed of sufficient merit, no prize will be awarded.

The prizes for the next four years will be allotted as follows :—

- 1945—Chemistry
- 1946—Physics
- 1947—Geology and Biology (including Pathology and Physiology).
- 1948—Mathematics

All essays submitted must have been published during the four calendar years immediately preceding that for which the prize is given.
